Herreshoff Museum Trip Report

Your Editor wasn't able to attend, but fortunately Charlie Tebbetts send in a report:

A group of sixteen (members and their guests) took a guided tour of the Herreshoff Museum in Bristol, RI on November 16th. The tour guide provided a brief history of the Herreshoff family and the great working relationship between older brother, JB and his younger brother, Nat. The boat building company they formed in the 1860's, the Herreshoff Manufacturing Company, built many fine vessels for the affluently rich, and the US Navy. HMC also built seven magnificent America's Cup defenders.

Both brothers had an engineering background. Nat came to the HMC upon his JB's request to help run the boat yard and be his older brother's eyes (JB had been blinded in one eye due to Glaucoma and suffered an injury to the other). JB then took on the business partner role at the dynamic boat yard. Nat, who had a very successful career at Corliss Steam Engine Co. in Providence before coming to work with his older brother, designed many highly advanced steam engines and flash boilers for the HMC. The HMC was sold to the Heffenreffer family in 1930 and continued to build and maintain vessels until the close of WWII in 1945.

After the tour many of the members had a leisurely lunch at the nearby Lobster Pot Restaurant. It was a wonderful November fall day with lots of sunshine and moderate temperatures. The only down side to the day was that we missed a tour of the Herreshoff model room (that contains half models and many plans of the Nat Herreshoff's design). (We were informed that the particular guide for this room was in Germany at an model boat show.) Some of the members told me that this has been the second time this has happened, and that we need to confirm that a tour will be available to that room if we should plan any future tours to the Herreshoff Museum.

Charlie sent this photo a triple-expansion steam engine from 1916. It powered JP Morgan's commuter yacht Navette. By this time, internal combustion engines had generally replaced steam but Morgan preferred the much quieter steam plant over a noisy gas engine. Steam was very expensive luxury, as it needed a larger boat to allow for the extra space it needed, plus you needed licensed Steam Engineers to operate it.

Morgan used the boat to commute from Glen Cove Long Island to Manhattan.

Linda Arini sent along a few photos from the museum-- looks like a nice collection of boats!
